Last Meeting

The last meeting was held on Sunday May 27 at the Qualicum and Graham park Community Centre.

President Maynard Dokken welcomed Peter Bomford to the meeting. Peter is still residing in the Civic Hospital undergoing therapy.

It was agreed that the Chapter picnic would be held at Maynard's cottage on Sunday July 15, with rain dates on each subsequent Sunday. A silent auction will be featured. Ben Roberts will send out details and directions for the picnic to all members well in advance of the date. Ben also announced that he now receives the Calgary Alberta Watch and Clock Collectors Newsletter and the Chapter 121 British Columbia "Time Lines" together with the ongoing NAWCC News as email attachments. Copies will be on display at each meeting. Anyone wanting personal copies, contact Ben. He also reminded members about the Canadian War Museum's wish to acquire a Canadian Government issue wrist watch from each of the three branches of the services for a permanent display of uniforms and equipment.

Charles Beddoe reported that the Chapter is in a good financial position, with a satisfactory bank balance.

For Show and Tell, Brian Hollebhone highlighted an article in the Horological Sciences Chapter 161 Newsletter, May issue 2001-2. This article described experiments with a pendulum consisting of two horizontal plates joined together by diagonal crossed wires. The pendulum rod, with a bob at the lower end, is suspended from the lower plate. With this arrangement, lengthening the pendulum results in a speeding up of its swing, while shortening it results in a slower swing.

Dan Hudon described the make up and aims of his Clock Repair course and announced final plans for holding the first session. This will be held at our usual meeting place at the Qualicum and Graham Park community Centre, on Sunday September 23 commencing at 9:00 AM. This is on the day of, and prior to, the next Chapter meeting. Each session of the course is expected to take about three hours. Further sessions will also take place in the same location on subsequent Sundays. Contact Dan for further information.

Jim Armstrong gave an interesting presentation on taking pictures of horological items using a digital camera, and appropriate lighting equipment. The talk was very well received, and many questions were asked.

Maynard Dokken spoke about, and showed samples, of various clock dials he had reproduced using a computer. They were produced from both original faded and worn dials and from pictures of dials. Ben Roberts followed with a few ideas on how to 'antique' or 'age' such dials.

Mart activity at the meeting was generally limited to a collection of tools and watch and clock books for sale. These were all from the estate of the late David Whittingham and were being sold by Ben Roberts on behalf of his widow. All the items were quickly purchased by the members present.



It was not until June 4 this year that, with time available and Frank Fowler visiting, we were all able to get together to make the journey to Deep River, and to spend three hours being guided through the museum by Allan. The visit and tour were enjoyed by Bill and Frank, both finding it interesting for different reasons. Bill for the high precision clocks and Frank for the Canadian Clocks. For my part the visit was rewarding because, when exposed to a large number of clocks in one location, it takes several visits before I can grasp all there is to see and learn. More visits are needed.

The display has been refined since the Chapter's visit last May, with descriptive labels and more clocks added. If you visit the museum, be sure to ask Allan to show you the clocks in storage, that will be cycled through the display area.

Allan seems pleased with the success of the museum. Robert Hawley Auction

The tall case clock pictured here was auctioned on 16 June 2001 at the Merickville Community Centre for \$1,100 plus taxes. No buyers premium.

The mahogany veneered English case of perhaps 1820 vintage is of Midlands origin. Some parts are missing, and the finials and top centre piece may have been replaced. The movement is a typical English movement of perhaps 1880 vintage, and its original bell, which was most probably cast iron, has been replaced by a French one dated 1908. The dial is mounted on a false plate,

and there are letters stamped on the movement which could not be deciphered. The dial is a white painted break arch, with a circular dished centre and a seconds dial. The movement and dial appear to match. The case and move-

ment appear to be a marriage, as there is a black wooden border surrounding the dial which, although well done, appears to be an addition to the original hood.



A three day auction was held at the Portsmouth Olympic Harbour Site, Kingston, Ontario, on May 19, 20 and 21. The auctioneers were Tim Potter and Cec Knight of Burnstown, Ontario, with Thomas Quirk as consultant. Prices included a 10% buyer's premium and the usual 15% tax. Catalogue descriptions of the nine clocks sold were as follows:

- Item 1. Small marble French clock with a Jape Freres movement. \$70.
- Item 2. Mickey Mouse alarm clock of German make ca. 1950-60. \$120
- Item 3. A bronze cased mantel clock: " Bigelow, Kennard Co. Inc." on dial, Chelsea movement. \$ 50.

- Item 4. English Mahogany Tall Case clock, painted dial, 88" high. Moon and date dial, Signed Josh. Gordon, B. Money. \$3750.
Note: Maker was undoubtedly Joseph Gordon of Ballymoney, Northern Ireland - Ben Roberts.
- Item 5. Wood case clock with carved gesso. 18" high with Chelsea movement. \$500.
- Item 6. Mantel clock. Art Deco metal. Onyx case. 6' high. \$175.
- Item 7. English Mahogany Tall case clock. Satin wood stringing. 90" high. \$3750.
- Item 8. Continental Boudoir clock. Drum nesting in a basket of fruit, supported by two slaves riding lions. Oblong plinth encrusted with gem stones and enamel. 5 1/2" high. Touch mark crown on crown. Possibly from 17-18th century? Said to be silver? No-jewel Swiss Strap movement. \$3000.
- Item 9. Tiffany Studios mantel clock. Patinated metal case with archaistic Chinese design. 6 1/2" high. Art Nouveau design brass case. Cathedral shape. Chelsea movement, Boston U.S.A. 'Tiffany Studios, New York' on dial. \$1600.
- Item 10. American Ebonized wood cased Mantel clock. Guilt metal mounts, 27" high. \$3750.






